Course Overview

Course Goals

Medicine and Behavior 201 (BMS 6821) addresses the psychological and social basis of patient and physician behavior and the influence of these factors on health, illness, and the practice of medicine. The emphasis of the course is on better understanding of the psychological and social context of patients' lives. Medicine and Behavior I covers basic behavioral science content as it relates to the individual, family, and community. The goal of this course is to have students apply these fundamental behavioral science principles to clinical situations for more effective and patient-centered delivery of health care. A variety of instructional methods are used to achieve these goals, including large group presentations, small group activities and discussions, videos, and expert panels.

Learning Objectives

- 1. Recognize the determinants of health and use of an integrated care model of healthcare delivery.
- 2. Apply behavioral, psychodynamic, social and developmental concepts in the description and analysis of patient behaviors and in patient care.

- 3. Recognize the role of family systems, community context, and cultural influences including spirituality, on patient behavioral presentations, interpretations of illness, and impact on treatment.
- 4. Recognize functional and dysfunctional family processes and how this impacts health and illness onset, course and management.
- 5 Review assessment of behavioral presentations and apply to clinical situations.
- 6. Identify psychopathological diagnosis in children, adolescents and young adults according to DSM IV and review appropriate treatment modalities.
- 7. Recognize community/societal challenges to psychological health.

Course Format

- 11 lectures; 4 in-class group activities; 5 panel discussions
- 1 off campus visit to an Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) Meeting

Exams will consist of multiple choice items. Exams are given according to the Year 2 integrated exam schedule. There are 20 items from this course on each exam. Exam materials cover readings, handouts, presentations and class discussions. Specific topic objectives are presented for each unit.

Grading Scale

FSU COM has adopted a pass/fail grading system is used in the curriculum for the first and second years. See page 31 of Student Handbook for details.

In order for a student to receive a grade of **Pass**, all the following required course activities must be completed:

- An average of 70% on all four block exams, with no individual exam score less than 65.
 Exams consist of multiple choice, best answer questions based on clinical vignettes. Any exam with score < 65 will need to be remediated in order to pass the class.
 - o Remediation will be in the form of an alternative essay exam on the same material.
- Satisfactory completion of 2 in-class group assignments (Units: Learning & Behavior Change; Child Psychopathology). Note that for an assignment to receive a satisfactory grade, it must be turned in by due date.
 - Remediation: Groups with unsatisfactory assignments will be provided an opportunity for remediation by meeting as a group with the course director for a one hour alternative assignment on the same material within two weeks of the completion of original assignment.
- Satisfactory completion of 4 reflection papers: Coping with Cancer; Families, Relationships & Health; Chronic Heart Failure, AA visit. Note that for an assignment to receive a satisfactory grade, it must be turned in by due date.
 - Remediation: Paper will be re-written using the feedback information provided by course director.
- Attendance at an AA meeting. Must be completed by 11-30-11 prior to the Substance Abuse class. Note that for an assignment to receive a satisfactory grade, it must be turned in by due date.
- Class Attendance: War Trauma and Substance Abuse & Impaired Physicians.
 - Remediation for this is only for students who have an excused absence from Office of Student Affairs. Remediation will consist of a 2 page paper reflecting that the student has viewed the video recording of the class.

Evaluations of peer professional behavior in small groups will be submitted by each student and will be included in the evaluation narrative provided at the end of the course.
